A NOTE FROM THE DIRECTOR SCOTT DUNLAP

Representation matters. I know this because my favorite animated film as a child was Peter Pan. Not because of the boy who wouldn't grow up, or the fairies or the pirates, but because of the undervalued middle brother, John Darling. You see in the late 70s and early 80s, the only animated characters to wear glasses were Velma in Scooby Doo, Marcie in the Peanuts tv specials and John Darling. Now, Marcie and Velma are being re-imagined as contemporary role models. However, at that time, they were hardly optional role models for the unathletic little kid with glasses growing up in Cleveland, TN. John Darling on the other hand got to go on adventures, in places like Neverland!

But as it turns out, Neverland has its own issues. I can conceptually understand how, for British children in 1904, the idea of an "Indian tribe" living on a fantastical island could be seen as harmless. The United States, itself considered a land of adventure, only numbered 45 states at that time. The romance of the Wild West was fresh fodder for all sorts of adventure books. So, it seemed perfectly natural that they should cohabitate on an island of every child's dream. I even struggle with my own love of being a "purist" with the story. Until I read an article from Dr. Adrienne Keene, a citizen of the Cherokee Nation and a faculty member at Brown University.

She says, "No matter how authentic and nuanced and perfect the portrayal of the Native people is, the bottom line is you are still placing actual Indigenous folks alongside fairies and mermaids and all of these fantasy creatures — and that's not something that is ever going to be positive for Indigenous people today." (To read more about her point of view, you can access her article in Indian Country Today with the headline Why 'Fix' Tiger Lily? Why Can't We Just Let Her Go?)

It seemed to me that the answer wasn't a question of "sensitivity," but instead representation. And we want to tell a story that welcomes everyone. So, the creative team thought long and hard about how Tiger Lily and her people should be portrayed. The answer seemed both simple and somewhat obvious. Back in the day when children still played outside, they would often play at Cowboys and Indians. So, what if we flipped the roles and focused on the Cowboys? What if they were Cowgirls, instead? And, inspired by another favorite story by Hans Christian Anderson, *The Snow Queen*, what if they were "Robber Girls?" After all, Tiger Lily and her tribe are a threat to both the Lost Boys and Pirates. Kids play at "Cops and Robbers" as well...so it seemed like a natural fit. Turns out the music even supported this decision, remove the definitive downbeat of the "tom-tom" and what you have left is sweeping melodies that evoke Aaron Copland.


Calvin, and Archie Reason. She would like to thank her husband for his infinite love and support, and Scott Dunlap for taking her along to Neverland.

1950-1959

The Chattanooga Theatre Centre a Decade of Momentum

By 1953, the Chattanooga Little Theatre, or CLT, had been producing plays and bringing entertainment to Chattanooga for 30 years. The 1950s were a time of great growth and momentum for this little theatre, building towards our expansion later on in the 1960s.

The theatre worked a little differently during this early period in its history than it does today. Considered a club, membership was required if you wanted to be involved in a show or see a production. Membership cost \$10, and was a marker of our growth and involvement. Also during this time, CLT's home was an old firehall, converted to a functional theatre. This theatre served as the canvas to all of the shows produced in the 1950s.

Ma and Pa Peruchi

During the early 1950s, we saw the end of the involvement of a couple very important to our history- 'Ma' and 'Pa' Peruchi. Once they were involved, they were ubiquitous. This dynamic couple directed and produced and designed every show from 1944-1952, and occasionally appeared on stage too! The story goes that Ma Peruchi, playing a background character in a garden, began to play "tipsy," effectively "stealing the show".

The 250 seat converted firehall/theatre, while lovely, began to be an issue as our membership grew. During the 1950s, we had to have shows run additional nights, to allow every member of the Little Theatre a chance to see them. This is when the Board of Directors started plans toward a new building, one with a larger theatre, dressing rooms, and adjacent parking facilities.
