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

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A NOTE FROM THE DIRECTOR SUZANNE SMARTT

In the New England fall of October 1962, after a prestigious party with the university president, his glamorous daughter (Martha) and her intellectual history professor husband (George) invite the young, the beautiful, and the newly married and naively unsuspecting couple (Nick and Honey) back to their on-campus home for elegant post-party drinks. As the evening by moonlight deepens, George and Martha drown Nick and Honey in a whiplash of emotional turbulence. Caught in a vortex of astounding abuse, sex, and falsehood ... the drinks *keep* coming. By dawn, no one emerges from the night the same as they went in.

Edward Albee, American Theatre Legend, has won three TONY Awards for Best Play. His second play on Broadway in the 1962-63 Broadway season, *Who's Afraid of Virginia Woolf*, won four TONYs -- Best Play, Best Actor, Best Actress, and Best Direction. In a raft of controversy, the play was also chosen for the 1963 Pulitzer Prize for Drama, except that....

"The award's (Pulitzer) advisory board – the trustees of Columbia University – objected to its profanity and sexual themes, and overruled the jury, awarding *no* Pulitzer Prize for drama in 1963." ~ Theatre World 62-63

Albee went on to win three Pulitzers for Drama and two Drama Desk Awards.

Chattanooga Theatre Centre's production stars an extraordinary professional cast sporting decades of regional awards and lead roles. You'll see fiery, CTC multi-award winner Wendy Tippens (Martha) going mano a mano with the dynamic winner of last season's CTC Star Turn Award, Josh Ruben (George). Lindsey Wills and Ford Knox (Honey and Nick) are highly trained theatre professionals. Miss Wills with a B.A. in Theatre from Oglethorpe University brings an extensive, exceptional resume for such a young artist. Mr. Knox, noted regionally as a strong talent, gives as good as he gets. A quartet of inventive theatrical artists bring the turbulence, the midnight glamour, the hits, and all possessing with tortuous expertise, fire-shot repartee sarcasm. Who's Afraid of Virginia Woolf is scorching hot. The language and emotions are raw. Brace yourself. There is no holding the turbulence back....

FORD KNOX, JR. (Nick) is happy to be back at CTC again performing in this dream role. He last acted at CTC in another dream role when he played Felix Unger in *The Odd Couple*. He most recently played as Professor Plum in *Clue*. As Fine Arts Chair

and Director of the award-winning Theatre Dept. at Northwest Whitfield HS, he's directed multiple regional/state championship-winning plays and Literary competitions. His students' success is due in part to the playwriting talents of wife, The Legendary Catherine Bolden. 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

SUZANNE SMARTT (Director) Who's Afraid of Virginia Woolf? is Suzanne's 30th collaboration with Chattanooga Theatre Centre. Last season she loved directing August: Osage County. Through her years at CTC, she directed several award winners, including Rumors, Smoke on the Mountain, Sanders Family Christmas, Steel Magnolias, All in the Timing, and Always... Patsy Cline. A winner of multiple Miss Annie awards; two

of her favorite roles: Nancy in Oliver! and Sister Robert Anne in Nunsense! She is a retired teacher (History, Theatre, Graphic Design) from the College Board Award-Winning Fine Arts Faculty of Girls Preparatory School. At GPS she was awarded Teacher of the Year and Distinguished Teacher Emeritus. Zanne was Artistic Director at Oak Street Playhouse for ten years. RODNEY VAN VALKENBURG (Executive Director) started his career at The Little Theatre in 1983 as the first full-time Youth Theatre director. He received his MFA in Acting and Directing from the University of North Carolina at Greensboro. Rodney shares his passion for theatre with his son, Jake, who lives in Atlanta.



RACHEL CARROLL (Marketing Manager) Joined Chattanooga Theatre Centre in early March. She received a Bachelor of Arts in Theatre from Lee University and a Master of Public Administration from UTC. After moving to Chattanooga six years ago, she has been an advocate for local arts and participated in the Holmberg Arts Leadership Academy in 2019. 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1960-1969

at Chattanooga Theatre Centre

The 1960s were a significant time of action and change, both in the country and for the Chattanooga Little Theatre, also known as CLT. In the late 1950s we began to grow out of the space we'd called home for 30 years, the old Fire Hall No. 4 on the corner of East 8th Street and Park Avenue. Additional shows were being scheduled to accommodate increasing audience numbers, and the facility was starting to show its age. Not to mention, parking was impossible. President of the Board Ms. Vera Munson started to set the gears in motion to build the CLT a modern, state of the art theatre facility. She presented plans for a facility to be built in the Highland Park area, but these plans were shelved after her sudden death in a car accident. Her plans were soon revised by the new Board, and a new location was proposed in North Chattanooga.



With a spot procured, all we needed was a quarter of a million dollars to build it. Mrs. Mildred Montague, the granddaughter of E. Y. Chapin, our very first board president, was elected finance chairman and soon got to work, raising all funds necessary in record time. Board Presidents Fielding Atchley and Alfred Smith, and resident director James Cavan, oversaw the details of the planning and building process. In the spring of 1962, CLT performed the last production on the Fire Hall stage, *The*

Happiest Millionaire. On November 16, 1962, just 6 months later, the new building on the river was opened with the production of Light Up the Sky, a comedy.



In 1963, the CLT was very interested in honoring and honing new talent in the community and beyond. They hosted a national playwriting contest and began offering classes! "The theater training classes will be formulated to teach interested young people the means and methods of theatre art" reads a 1963 newspaper article, announcing the educational addition to the theatre's programming. Continuing their growth, Albert Gresham was hired in 1965 to be the CLT's resident director, and

worked as such until 1983. Hailing from Memphis, Gresham was quickly heralded for his quality and versatility as a director.

In 1964, Humphrey Heywood became president, and set his sights on the creation of a Circle Theatre for children's productions. While the CLT had produced children's theatre sporadically since its beginning, Heywood dreamed of a dedicated space for continual programing. The physical Circle Theatre was not added on to the preexisting building until the 1970s, after help from Mildred Montague again in raising money for the project. Even so, the presence of children's productions and opportunities for teens greatly expanded in the 1960s under Heywood's leadership. Heywood remained board president of the CLT until 1979.
